Summary Revelation

Summary Revelation

The Kingdom gathers many now, but judgment will reveal what is genuine.

Everyone is caught in the net, but only the true are kept. And every disciple becomes a keeper of priceless truth.

Summary Revelation

Jesus returns home, but instead of being celebrated, He is **rejected** by those who thought they knew Him best. This reveals:

- Familiarity can blind us to God's work
- Unbelief blocks blessing
- Spiritual honor is often denied by those closest to us
- Yet Jesus continues His mission unfazed

Faith makes room for miracles; unbelief makes room for nothing.
