Matthew 11:23	"And you, Capernaum, will you be lifted to the heavens? No, you will go down to Hades."	Hades – realm of the dead; Lifted (hypsoō) – to exalt or raise high.	Pride leads to downfall; spiritual privilege without repentance brings destruction.	Stay humble and repentant—God resists the proud but gives grace to the humble.
Matthew 11:24	"But I tell you that it will be more bearable for Sodom on the day of judgment than for you."	Sodom – symbol of wickedness and judgment; Day of judgment – final divine reckoning.	Unrepentance in the face of revelation is worse than blatant sin without truth.	Don't ignore God's mercy—repentance is the proper response to revelation.

Summary Revelation

This passage reveals that spiritual privilege brings spiritual responsibility. Jesus rebukes the cities that witnessed His greatest miracles yet failed to repent, showing that unbelief in the presence of revelation leads to judgment.

The contrast with Tyre, Sidon, and Sodom reminds us that God values humility and repentance over status and exposure to truth.

Revelation calls for response—seeing Jesus' works and hearing His Word requires a change of heart, not passive acknowledgment.

- Theme: Spiritual pride leads to ruin—elevation without repentance results in condemnation.

Matthew 11:24

"But I tell you that it will be more bearable for Sodom on the day of judgment than for you."

• Cross References

- o Genesis 19:24–28 God's destruction of Sodom for wickedness.
- o Ezekiel 16:49–50 Sodom's sin was arrogance, neglecting the poor, and pride.
- o Luke 17:28–30 Jesus compares His coming judgment to the days of Sodom.
- Theme: Rejection of revelation is worse than ignorance—knowing truth yet refusing it is the gravest sin.
